Minutes of NAWCC Atlanta Meeting on Oct. 1, 2017

Brooks Coleman started us off with the auction, including some items donated to the club.

Chapter member Dick Johnson introduced Wayne Miller, an Eagle scout and Troop 463 Scout Master. Wayne explained that the Boy Scouts of America (BSA) merit badge sash shows a scout's interest, with 135 possible badges, but there is nothing about clocks, watches, or time. He said that youth and adults love the ideas of the measurement of time, gears, sprockets, the movement of time, how clocks work, and pendula. A time/horology related merit badge could get kids curious. In local Atlanta there are 30,000 cub scouts ages 6-10, with 12-50 kids per pack, in general. Wayne suggests that it is possible to make a proposal to the BSA National Headquarters for new merit badge. Most proposals are rejected for not being fun, or don't promote curiosity. A merit badge is a window to show you a subject that you might use for the rest of your life. We could start by creating a program to show to packs. Randy Grunwell, Jim Guinn, and Wayne will start a



committee to get this going. The suggestion passed unanimously. Jim Coulson suggested we checked with National to see if this has been done before. Brooks Coleman suggested we also contact the Girl Scouts of the USA to see if they are also interested.

President Jae Martin introduced the visitors, and new member Paul Carahan, who is joining us from another club, and is interested in high-end watches.

OCTOBER PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

Member Bill Knaak introduced new member Tom McCalab who gave a presentation on how to refinish a case. Tom worked at 3M in abrasives. He asked us if anyone has tried to clean up a messy case? 3M developed wet or dry sand paper. The question is how to repair a case without removing the original finish. A lot of work goes into cleaning the case. He suggests starting with 600 grade sandpaper. Remove the alligatoring without all of the finish. Then move on to 800 and 1000 grade. He goes up to 3000 grade, which is made for the automotive industry. You can get it at an automotive store. Wrap sandpaper around a small piece of squeegee. Also, get abrasive compound, put it on string or strip of old cotton to get into crevices. A question was asked regarding how wet should the paper be. Tom said to keep the paper in water for days or months. Keep rag to wipe to see how much you've removed. Wax will fill scratches from sand paper. To remove some of the shine from smoothing finish you could use Trizact 3000. A good finishing job can really bring out the wood of the case. Tom suggests polishing the brass as well.

FROM THE NORTHWEST: Take the I-85 east exit from I-285. Exit 99 and turn right on Jimmy Carter (Hwy 140). Continue and bear left onto Rockbridge Rd. Aquatic Center will be on right—two blocks before Five Forks Trickum Rd.

FROM CUMMING / HALL COUNTY: Take Exit 101 Indian Trail / Lilburn Rd NW off southbound I-85. As you cross Hwy 29 Lawrenceville Rd, Indian Trail becomes Killian Hill Rd. Turn right onto Five Forks Trickum Rd. Turn right onto Rockbridge Rd. Aquatic Center is two blocks north on left.

FROM THE SOUTH (IN TOWN): Take I-285 to Exit 39B which is Highway 78, continue on 78 to Exit 7 onto Hugh Howell Road. After this exit, immediately turn right onto Lilburn-Stone Mountain Road. After 0.2 mile, turn right onto Old Stone Mountain Road. Continue to the intersection of Rockbridge and Five Forks Trickum. Turn left on Rockbridge Rd. The Aquatic Center is two blocks north on left.
